National Catholic Education Association Recognizes Mrs. Quiles with Lead. Learn. Proclaim. Award



We are so proud of our President and former Principal Providencia Quiles for being awarded the Lead. Learn. Proclaim (LLP) Award by the National Catholic Education Association (NCEA) as an outstanding leader in Catholic Education.

The NCEA announced nine recipients of the 2021 LLP Award, highlighting the outstanding work being done in Catholic education communities across the country. This year the honored individuals are educators, principals and pastors entrusted with the faith formation of our Catholic school communities.

"Catholic schools offer an education that combines Catholic faith and teachings with academic excellence," said NCEA Interim President/CEO Kathy Mears. "We draw on the Church's long tradition of educating the whole person: mind, body and spirit. This is done as a community pursuing faith, truth, beauty, goodness, wisdom and virtue. These leaders are the core of our Catholic school education system and serve as inspiration to all of us working within the framework of Catholic education."

Mrs. Quiles began her career in Catholic schools as a substitute teacher after a business career. She was offered a full-time position at Most Holy Trinity in Brooklyn, teaching math and science to sixth, seventh and eighth graders until her friend, Mr. DeSimone, suggested she interview at his school, Nazareth. She took the position as a ninth grade English teacher and after three years became the Assistant Principal of Academics. Two years later she was asked to apply to be the Principal.

In her first year as principal, the Nazareth Board of Trustees announced that the school would be closing its doors in June 2011. An impromptu assembly of more than 850 angry and passionate students, parents, coaches, faculty, administration and alumni got to work. Staff, select parent advisory members and especially Sharon Patrick, "our angel," and Mrs. Quiles created and executed a "Save the School" campaign to meet the board-stipulated three benchmarks: 1) Raise \$700K; 2) Enroll 80 students; and 3) Create a specific plan for the future of Nazareth. Nine years later, Nazareth's Legacy continues by educating 99 percent minority students in inner-city Brooklyn with a 100 percent graduation rate and 98 percent of students college bound.

NCEA recognized these esteemed awardees of the 2021 Lead. Learn. Proclaim. Award with a virtual tribute in April 2021.

The Students Returned To Nazareth



Nazareth began the year with remote learning as we remained dedicated to keep our students, families, faculty, and staff safe during the pandemic. All the stakeholders were invited to participate in that dialogue in order to come to that decision.

We were thrilled to be able to invite students back into the building on November 9th as we entered hybrid learning. On top of all the protocols in place for every person entering the building, including temperature checks, social distancing, and use of PPE for safety, our students were invited back in shifts, with Cohort A in the building on Monday and Tuesday and Cohort B welcomed on Thursday and Friday. Each student remained in distance learning on the remaining days, with Wednesday being a full remote day in order to deep clean the building.

Although every family has the choice to opt out of in-person learning during this time, having so many of our students back in the building has brought such positive energy to the Nazareth community. And while we have been so impressed by our students, faculty, and staff during remote learning, it is impossible to replace the presence in the building.



This hybrid learning has enabled us to bring the whole school together in a way that is both tangible and often creative. We are able to gather socially distanced for Mass in our chapel, while live streaming the celebration to our students at home for remote learning and allowing them to participate in the Mass as if they were there. It has also allowed our after-school activities to continue in a more traditional way. We loved having all our coaches and club moderators and students participating in workouts and club meetings on Zoom, but being able to have some of our students in the gym and in the classroom has pushed those activities further in a way so important to the education of the whole student.

Our athletic teams returned to action this spring with abbreviated seasons for Basketball, Baseball, Softball, and Football. Having our teams practicing and competing has been so important for our

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student athletes, particularly our seniors who have worked hard over their academic careers and deserved a final sendoff with their teammates.

On top of that, we have had our students painting after school, all grades participated in a socially-distanced version of Nazareth Follies, playing games as classes to promote camaraderie and school spirit, and most importantly the students who thrive back in the classroom have the extra layer of in person support back in a more normal and traditional scenario.

Nazareth Remembers Brother Matthew Burke



It is with great sorrow that we announce the passing of Brother Matthew Burke, C.F.X. on Friday, November 27th 2020 at Nazareth Home in Louisville. Although Brother Matthew had tested positive for COVID-19, his death was due to the complications from the dementia he has suffered from the past few years.

He came to Nazareth in 1962 as a teacher at the brand-new high school, and in 1967 was named Deputy Principal. He was appointed Principal two years later, serving in that role from 1969-1975. He was beloved in both roles by the entire Nazareth community, and he remained a part of the school long after he moved on to lead other schools and other missions. Brother Matthew was a frequent guest at the many reunions our classes had over the years and became great friends with many of his former students. He was a lifelong supporter of Nazareth, always willing to help in any way to improve the future of this school. Brother Matthew was a great figure in Nazareth's history, not only as a faculty member and principal during Nazareth's formative years, but as a great supporter of Nazareth his entire life. He has touched the lives of so many who have been honored to know him, and he will be missed tremendously by the entire community.

Beyond Nazareth, Brother Matthew made a tremendous impact in many other ways as a Xaverian Brother. Not only was he able to reach the lives of many in school communities, but he was a leader of many missions and projects of great importance. Dr. Una Clarke has come to the end of her term as a member of Nazareth Regional High School's Board of Trustees. Her service to Nazareth has been integral in forming the school's current standing with the community, and she has been a great resource in the school's continuing mission to be on the cutting edge of high school education and keeping Nazareth affordable for all students.

Dr. Clarke was the first Caribbean-born woman elected to the New York City's legislature; her hard work and tireless advocacy had been benefitting Nazareth long before she became officially affiliated with us. As an elected official she sponsored more than 300 pieces of legislation on a wide range of issues including child welfare, education, health and mental health issues, economic development, public safety, and transportation.

An educator by profession, she has leveraged millions of dollars to upgrade schools in her district and made them technologically ready for the 21st century with computer labs in every school and a model program for multi-media instruction. In addition, Dr. Clarke fought to expand services for the elderly, rebuild parks and playgrounds and increase quality childcare programs. Dr. Clarke was appointed in 2001 by Governor George Pataki as Director of the Empire State Development Corporation for the borough of Brooklyn, and in 2015 she was appointed to the Board of Trustees of the City University of New York (CUNY).

We are unbelievably thankful for the time and effort Dr. Clarke has given to Nazareth over the years, and we appreciate her taking a stand with Nazareth. While she will no longer officially be a member of our Board of Trustees, the impact she has made on our students has created a legacy that will last forever. The Board and administration look forward to her continued support as an ally and a friend, and lifetime member of the Nazareth community.

God bless Dr. Una Clarke, and may He watch over her in all her future endeavors. She will always be an important part of the Nazareth family.

Coach Thomas represented the best of what Nazareth has to offer, being more than a coach but the figurehead of a Nazareth family. He embodied the idea that there were many ways to receive the fundamentals of education, but that the building of social bonds and the development of relationships add value to the character of the students that follows them throughout their lives. While Dr. Yetman practices medicine professionally, he hopes his expertise in finance and investing will serve as an asset to Nazareth, with goals of increasing our endowment efforts as part of our Board of Trustees, and helping to shape a curriculum that puts an emphasis on the financial education of our students so they are prepared for success as graduates of Nazareth, so he can help impact the next generation of Nazareth alumni. Esports Comes to Nazareth

Nazareth has officially joined the world of online gaming. Esports is one of the fastest-growing sources of college scholarships, and Nazareth now has a team to give our students an outlet to compete. The club has been in the works for a while, but with the leadership of our students we have formally created a team that is actively practicing a number of popular titles, including Apex Legends, Rocket League, and Super Smash Bros. Ultimate, among others and looking to add more.

Esports has really given our students a sense of belonging and community. It has been particularly significant to our new 9th graders who have not yet had the opportunity to be in the physical building of our school with the entire student body. Through online gaming they have had a chance to be amongst their classmates and upperclassmen and form the bonds of community Nazareth prides itself on. In a short time, the Esports team has become a small family of its own.

Our team has the option to compete at home on their personal computers and consoles, or in person in our computer lab where we have set up a number of machines for online play. Whether they are home or in the building, the team is connected through Google Meets like any other class or club where they can see and talk to each other, and they are also utilizing popular gaming apps such as Discord and Twitch to connect with each other outside of school.

In the coming years, we expect our Esports program to compete on a Varsity level, and eventually the goal is to have multiple teams playing a variety of titles, and to nurture a Junior Varsity team to develop skills for students still learning some of these games. We hope to inspire our competitor schools to initiate their own Esports programs and give us the ability to compete not only globally and nationally, but locally as well. Esports has been part of the plan at Nazareth since before the pandemic forced us into remote learning, and while this program has made huge strides in the past year and has been vital to the life of the school since initiated, we only look for the program to get stronger as more students return to the building. Developing and investing in

this new venture will create opportunities for our students both in fostering their interests in a socially productive way, but it will lead to more opportunities to get noticed and separate themselves from their peers while competing for scholarship money at the college level.

Nazareth Regional High School is deeply saddened to announce the deaths of the following members of our family who have passed away recently. We pray for each of them and their families during this difficult time.

Brother Matthew Burke, Former Principal and Faculty Member

Brother Matthew is one of the most important figures in Nazareth's history, and he is commemorated in this issue of Excalibur on the front cover, as well as pages 11 and 12.

Mr. Pete Holmes, Former Faculty Member

Pete Holmes passed away on January 13. He was a beloved teacher for more than two decades at Nazareth, who had a tremendous impact on our students during the formative years of the school. He taught in the History department and oversaw the Theatre and Arts departments at Nazareth. He is remembered lovingly by our alumni, and by his wife Joan.

Mr. Fred Protopappas, Class of 1966

Fred was a record-setting track athlete at Nazareth High School, and was recruited to Georgetown University, from which he received a track scholarship. At Georgetown he received a BA, MA, and PhD in Chinese Language and Literature. Fred spent his professional career at the Library of Congress, where he began as a cataloger of Chinese language materials. He retired as Senior Overseas Operations Officer, having traveled to and worked with the Library's offices in Cairo, Rio, New Delhi, Nairobi, Islamabad, and Jakarta.

Coach Isidro "Izzy" Padilla

Coach Izzy was a former Baseball, Softball, Soccer, Basketball, and Swimming Coach at Nazareth Regional High School. He was beloved by all his student athletes, as well as his fellow coaches, and as a New York City teacher, impacted the lives of thousands of young men and women over his career.

Mr. Kevin Gillespie, Class of 1985



"Can we "reverse engineer" our current name? I'm going to guess that it is a reference to Christ the King, as well as Kings County. Can we come up with another name that would embody both of these?"

"We've been Kingsmen for years don't change it."

"I always thought the King comes from Kings County that Brooklyn is called."

"The mascot is a suit of armor. Is it a man or a woman? It's neither. I'm all for inclusion but the mascot and the name Kingsmen is synonymous with Nazareth. Some traditions need to endure despite the pressures of today's overly sensitive world. Besides - what would I do with all my shirts!"
