Lent is a 40-day season of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving that starts on Ash Wednesday and ends on Holy Thursday. It is connected to the 40 day fast that Jesus underwent when he was tempted by Satan. Lent is a time to prepare our hearts for the sacrifice that Christ gave for us. Lent is observed by Catholics and by Christians in other denominations. Some sacrifices include abstaining from meat on Fridays or from certain habits that a person selects. XBSS Student Retreat 2023

The Xaverian Brothers Sponsored Schools (XBSS) grew out of the vision of Theodore James Ryken, who founded the Xaverian Brothers in 1839. His inspiration was St. Francis Xavier. Through the mission of the Xaverian Brothers, schools have been established all over the world that follow the virtues of compassion, trust, humility, zeal, and simplicity. Thirteen of those schools, including Nazareth, are in the U.S. In March, junior and senior student leaders from these schools met in West Hartford, CT for the annual XBSS Student Retreat. I am so thankful that I was able to attend as one of the junior student leaders from Naz.

Walking into the retreat center on March 5th, I immediately sensed a shift within myself. The staff waiting by the entrance were very welcoming and made me feel at home. After we settled our belongings in our rooms, it was time to work on our school board. During this time, we got to walk around and meet new people. People would introduce themselves to us, and from there the bonds began to flourish.

To kick off the retreat, we listened to a talk given by Nazareth's senior leader, Arsh Guirand. His talk opened our eyes to see what this retreat could bring forth for ourselves and others. That same night, when we met in small groups with students from other schools, I sensed that everyone was feeling a little out of their element. We were not with our school friends and had to speak to people that we were meeting for the first time. However, within the hour or so that I spent with my small group, I found a family that I will always cherish.

One of the retreat's main purposes was to gain insight into how other schools practice their faith and bring back some of their ideas to our own school. The retreat accomplished that purpose and so much more. There were also times when we could interact with students from other schools that were not in our small group. There was a social hour where we could talk to new people and make plenty of new friends. I met many new people who had interests and views that were similar to my own.

Each school was responsible for one of the multiple prayer services that we had each day. Every prayer service contained a meaningful message that I will forever hold close to my heart. We also had small group meetings everyday, which consisted of talking about our feelings, schools, and much, much more. Many speakers from different schools spoke to us about the values they have learned while being in a Xaverian Brothers Sponsored School. Through those talks I learned the value and importance of being myself and helping others. The small group meetings and the talks that we heard have taught me so many new things that are helping me to become a new person.

One of the most moving parts of the retreat was the event that took place on Wednesday, the day before we left. We went with our small groups to a service site to help others. My small group went to a soup kitchen called "The House of Bread." We helped stock the pantry, cleaned the kitchen before and after the meals were served, and served the homeless. Once we stepped foot into the soup kitchen, I felt like I was in my element. I was so happy to be there to help, and I could tell that

She is a nun who founded House of Bread over 40 years ago, and she still plays an active role at the site. After thanking her and the kitchen staff for letting us volunteer, we were on our way back to the retreat center.

Once we got back, we sat in our groups and discussed how we felt during the service trip, and we had nothing but great feelings. After we spoke about the experience, we each wrote a letter to one of the Xaverian Brothers. I do not remember the name of the brother I wrote to, but I do remember writing to him about how blessed I felt to be able to be on this retreat with like minded people, and I thanked him for helping to make this opportunity possible.

Later that night, when we were in our small groups, we all wrote letters to each other, and it was one of the most heartwarming experiences I have ever had. I remember writing heartfelt messages to each of my small group members, because throughout the whole retreat they did not show me anything less than respect and kindness. In their letters to me, they wrote things about me that I did not even realize myself. This caused me to feel so much closer to them and to see them as more of a family rather than as just friends. After our service trip and reading the letters my group wrote to me, I felt even closer to them than I had before.

The XBSS retreat has been and continues to be a learning experience for me and for all the other students who attended. Through this retreat I have grown closer to God, and I have found a family in a new environment. Within those four days, I was able to find a new set of friends who helped me to find myself.


