Class of '67 Exceeds Goal for Endowment

Members of the Class of 1967 have reached – and surpassed – their goal for a scholarship endowment, collecting almost \$170,000 to help Nazareth students with their tuition.

According to **Steve Gandley**, the class captain, the groundwork was laid before their 50th reunion a few years ago, for which they compiled a Google group of more than 150 classmates and faculty members that they use to keep in touch with each other and plan events.

After that reunion and the death of a classmate, **Ed Feeley**, they decided to work through that Google group to try to raise close to \$10,000 for a one-time scholarship in his memory.

When that succeeded, Ron Franzese, another member of the class, suggested that they raise an even larger amount of money and invest it to provide for a recurring scholarship.

Once they began fundraising and set a target of \$150,000, "little by little we kept growing and growing," the endowment, Gandley said. Four

members of the class made donations that accounted for about half of the total.

"We have some guys who automatically make monthly donations," Gandley added.

"One of the guys is on this medical board ... and they have this matching program, so he's been

putting in \$5,000 and they've been matching \$5,000. So I'm hoping that continues too."

The first one-year scholarship payment will be made this spring, and the school will determine whether the annual payouts will go to one student or be broken up.

"We'll leave it in their hands to make the correct decision, because they know best," Gandley said.

Besides their 50th and 55th reunions, which each drew about 100 guests, the class gets together often and sometimes hosts dinners with former teachers. In May, for example, the classmates are planning a gathering in Boston "to go to dinner and go to Fenway Park for a game."

In the meantime, the group hopes to grow the endowment even further.

"We're all in the area of 75 years old," Gandley said, "so we're running out of time. But hopefully the endowment will be there forever,

Another Way to Present the Nazareth Story

Thanks to a donation from Mike Flynn '70, the school now has a fresh batch of promotional material.

After three days of filming in September, Tom Flynn, Mike's son, produced several videos along with still photography illustrating the school's story.

One video features descriptions from students and shows boys and girls sport teams, the science lab, the robotics lab and the chapel. "We filmed all over the school," Mike said. The material can be configured as presentations, commercials or social media ads or posts.

Tom runs a production company that does promotional spots, music videos and TV commercials, including one for the Super Bowl.

He took the Nazareth work on as a personal project, which kept costs down, and brought a small team along with him. Mike financed the project with a generous donation.

"I told him [Tom] I would really like to see the school get some really good promotional material" as a way to boost enrollment and to "make people recognize ...that the school is there," Mike said.

A substantial donor who retired from 35 years as a trial lawyer, Mike explained, "I just wanted to do






something different, have a bigger impact."


The videos appear on the school's Facebook and Instagram pages, and the next step will be to figure out how to get them in front of people who don't already follow the school on social. To see one, click here.

'92 Grad Rises to the NY Supreme Court

Keisha Alleyne '92 was sworn in last month to a 14-year term as a judge on the New York State Supreme Court.

'So far it's going great," she said recently. "The work I'm doing is very important. It's definitely impactful to the community and that's what I love about it. It's definitely needed."

Running on the Democratic and Conservative lines, she received 503,459 votes, more than the six other judges elected in November to the court's Second Judicial District, which covers Brooklyn. The State Supreme Court is the "state-wide trial court with the broadest jurisdiction, both in criminal and civil matters." according to the state. Alleyne handles adult guardianship cases.

Before her most recent election, she became a judge in 2022 for New York City's Civil Court, which has jurisdiction over cases and claims of up to \$50,000.

Alleyne, a member of Nazareth's Board of Trustees since 2017, grew up in Brownsville, where she was born.

After Nazareth, she attended Bryant University in Rhode Island, where she earned an accounting degree by 1996 and moved on to the Thurgood Marshall School of Law at Texas Southern University. She also earned a law Masters in taxation at New York Law School.

She was a corporate lawyer before becoming a judge. And she founded a company that provided mentoring and career and Attorney General Letitia professional consulting James. services.

Alleyne credits Nazareth with setting "the foundation for my education and what expectations for excellence should be."

And while at Nazareth she played on the volleyball team. "Playing volleyball is what took me to college" she said.

"So if it wasn't for those foundational things that were important in high school, I probably never would have been at Bryant."

Her induction last month took place at a ceremony attended by more than 300 family, friends and political leaders, including U.S. Senator Charles Schumer and New York State

The oath was administered by her friend Justice Valerie Cartwright from Nassau County, alongside Alleyne's aunt, Veronica Morgan-Price, a retired judge from Houston, Texas.

Holding the Bible was Alleyn's husband, Robert, a Naval Academy graduate who has a tech consulting company.

In today's Brooklyn, Nazareth is not without its existential challenges, primarily as a result of the shrinking number of Catholic grammar feeder schools (e.g. Little Flower (St. Theresa of Lisieux on East 47th Street and Avenue D closed its doors in June). In addition New York now offers many options to students at secondary charter schools, where tuition is not an issue.

However with the generosity of alums and the dedication of those mentioned above, Nazareth plans its future as a Xaverian Sponsored Catholic Secondary School in its U.S. network

of brother and sister schools.

Our annual "Spirit on Nazareth Campaign" was launched in late November and I appeal to you as friends of Nazareth for your continued generosity and support and we are indeed grateful for all that many of you have contributed in the past.

I close with a quote from one of the more recent graduates, who dropped a note following a recent reunion saying: "as I looked around the room, I realized that 20 years later my BEST friends are my Nazareth friends."



Remembering Back-to-Back City Champions

Forty years ago, Nazareth athletes were in the middle of winning back-to-back victories in the 1984 and 1985 Metro Bowl championship for high school football teams in New York City

Plans are in the works for a May 31 reunion to mark the anniversary of the dual achievements.

The first of two championships, each by teams coached by Dom Laurendi, came on Dec. 1, 1984.

After winning the Catholic High School Football League's Division II championship that year with an 8-2 overall record and being undefeated in the league, the varsity team went to the Metro Bowl B Championship to defeat John Jay High School, the winner of the Public School Athletic League's championship, 39-12.

"The defense was unyielding," the Knight

Nazareth's Football Teams Rejoining the CHSFL

Nazareth's football program is back in the big league.

The school has accepted an official invitation to return to the Catholic High School Football League for the 2025-26 academic school year.

"It's a big, big deal, especially helping our enrollment," said Mike Camacho, the school's athletic director.

The school has been given a seven-game schedule that includes Holy Cross, St. Dominic and Christ the King.

Coach Gary Gooden '85 said he was "most definitely" looking forward to being back in the league.

"We're very excited because we did have a championship pedigree," he explained, harkening back to teams from earlier decades.

"It's more structure," Camacho said of rejoining the CHSFL. "It gets a little more emphasis with the kids," knowing that games were set, which wasn't always the case outside the league.

"We were independent for the past couple of years, trying to grow the team back," Camacho said. "And we were scrambling to look for games."

"Covid kind of crippled us," Camacho said. "And when we tried to rebuild we had at that time 12 kids, and they were young, they were freshmen and sophomores."

Camacho will be happy to have a more certain schedule than the school had as an independent, along with the ability to look ahead and scout out the teams they'll be facing in the future.

"As of now we have 33 kids on the team and it's consistently growing."

"Coach Gary Gooden did a great job of bringing the kids in." Camacho explained.

"He does a great jobs of keeping the kids together throughout the school year. The kids play football

and when they're done with football they go right into track."

Gooden elaborated: "I had to put my ear to the ground and try to get kids interested in playing football. We have a lot of kids who never played before but we had to coach them up and get them prepared them to get on the field."

The boys and girls varsity basketball teams ended their regular seasons at home on February 9 with victories against Xaverian.

The boys team clipped the Clippers 70-63 to polish off an overall season record of 12-7. Their record in league play was 6-5, which netted them a third-place finish.

The girls team won their match by an even wider margin, 66-56 to also place third in their league.

"They were both intense games, but we pulled away," said Mike Camacho, the school's athletic director. "The seniors had a nice good-bye for their last home game."

The third-place finish for each team put them in position for a better playoff matchup.

The boys team beat Archbishop Molloy High School, 67-63, in the first playoff round on February 17 at Molloy.
